"418 HAS ROOM FOR YOU

Young men and women interested in serving with 418 Reserve Squadron are invited to enquire for information by 'phoning Lieutenant B. Cartmell: at 799-3922 or contact the Recruiting Center in Hanagar No. 3 Canadian Forces Base, Edmonton, (Namao) seven miles north of the city on Highway 28.

Males 16 years or over may train as A ministrative Clerks or Aviation Technicians. Training includes classroom theory, on-th-job work and application of skills as progression through the particular thade continues.

Females 18 and over train as Administrative Clerks in one of severla areas: Finance, Orderly-Room, Ground Training, or Rectuiting. Classroom theory and on-the-job training are involved, to qualify as an Administrative Clerk.

From September to June, parades are held each Wednesday night from 7:30 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. and each Sunday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. During the first summer of enrolment, a non-compulsory summer camp in held in either Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg or Edmonton.

All airmen and women are given basic military training and extensive training in their prospective trades during this time. Propective Administrative Clerks are taught Air Force procedures to enable them to work with regular Air Force Units if necessary. Aviation Technicians are taught basic theories of Aircraft Maintenance including airframe, aereoengine, aircraft electronics, instruments, refuelling, marshalling and aircraft safety procedures.

All members of 418 Reserve Squadron wear the uniform of the Canadian Air Force, Mobile Command and are paid for their services.

Do you find you have nothing to do Saterday nights? If so come to Co-Ed Sports night, in the McNally gym, 7:00 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. This is sponsored by the Parks and Recreation department of the city of Edmonton. Don't expect to use any school equipment because of administrators' opinions. But there will be Floor Hockey, basketball, volleyball, and badminton offered.

While undergoing basic training, a trainee is paid approximatly \$5.00 a day. After completing basic training and passing trade advancement exams, the pay scale is increased according to the rank obtained. A Corporal earns \$9.10 a day; a Sergeant, \$11.60 a day. Promotions are on the basis of personal ability after the completion of requirments.

There are unlimited opportunities for flying either on local trips, on duty with the Regular Air Force during Search and Rescue operations or in support of the Regular Army personnel throughout all of Alberta, Northeastern British Columbia, and parts of Saskatchewan. During these trips, pay is increased to a point well above normal Reserve pay rates.

Approximately 150 person= el now serve with 418 Air Reserve Squadron, why not join them and wear the uniform of the Canadian Air Force?
