recently aquired The Courtyard is now under a foot of snow so this brings up many ideas on what could be done to make it usefull during the whole school year rather than six months (in a good year). Suggestions such as putting a roof or plexiglass dome over it can be heard around the hallways (if you listen very closely), but think about it. Certainly plexiglass dome has it all over a solid roof that would kill the grass and leave us with nothing more than a high roofed room with a dirt floor that can be seen from eleven seperate rooms. 
Well, here it is. The Article everyone's been waiting for. A Guest Editorial from the Student's Union at Jasper Place to us, the students of McNally.

GRAD COUNCIL FORMED--JUST BARELY



And so, after all, the Grad Council was elected.


Marj Meters was elected President. She'll be assisted by Vice-Pres Lauri Baldwin. Secretary is Jill Stiles.

We hope that the Grads this year will get behind their council and help in planning the most successful Graduation ever. Lots of Luck—and a wish for a little help from your friends.


